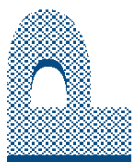
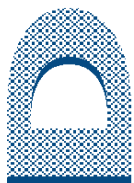

Items of Interest . . .

Session did not meet during the month of May. There was little to no business requiring action and, with Pastor Rob in Colorado, we opted not to hold a ZOOM meeting for him to be able to moderate. Therefore I will use this space to give you a few tidbits that would not normally be in the Session Highlights.

Upcoming Congregational Meeting:

Firstly, we will have a congregational meeting soon to elect the Officer Nominating Committee. The date for the meeting has not yet been set as the meeting requires a moderator. The committee nominees are being put forward by each ministry group of our church. Plus, there are two elders from different classes who will chair and co-chair the committee. These two are put forward by the session, and there is one deacon representative. Nominations may also be made from the floor, as long as you have asked the person you are nominating, and they have agreed to serve. This committee will meet through the summer and in September there will be another congregational meeting to elect the elders and deacons put forward by the ONC (or floor nominees) for the next three-year term. We have 12 elders and 12 deacons serving, in general for a three-year term. Our congregation elects both men and women as elders and deacons as is allowed by the EPC under their motto of: In Essentials: Unity; in Non-essentials: Liberty; In All Things: Charity.

Endowment Challenge Met—Thanks to All!

You may have seen [page 5] that the congregation has finally matched the generous \$100,000 challenge gift to the Community Foundation-based Endowment Fund for Missions and Local Outreach. In all, \$205,000 has now been given to the fund. Along with the four payouts per year that have been received by the church, which are equally split between our missionaries and the local agencies we support, the fund, due to investment appreciation, was worth \$255,000 in its previous financial statement. Thanks to everyone for their very generous support of this project, but remember, the fund is still there, if you feel called to further support our church's work in this way.

EPC General Assembly set for June in Memphis

The EPC General Assembly will take place in Memphis, TN, on June 22-25. We always pray for the work of our General Assemblies, although no longer with such a sense of desperation as we once did.

Long COVID Hibernation—Almost over at last?

Our church's COVID-19 Task Force is currently looking at the various ways and a timeline so that the church can come back to full functioning over the next several weeks and months. It has been great to see everyone's smiling faces again over the last few weeks. It will be equally exciting to share fellowship over cookies and punch and so many of the functions of our congregation that we have missed, but have managed to survive the last year-plus without.

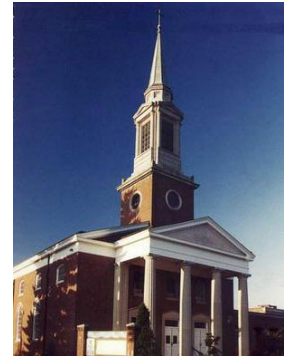

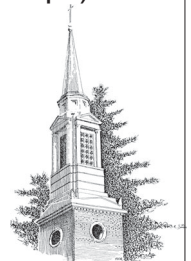

As in the story of the loaves and fishes, God doesn't just *add* to what we give—He *multiplies* what we give!

Meet the little girl who God used to make Temple University (and so much more) possible

Little Hattie May Wiatt became well-known for an inspiring act of charity. According to Temple University founder Russell Conwell, Hattie May was a student in his church's Sunday School; however many students, including herself, could not attend because the room was too small. Finding Hattie outside, Conwell says he brought her inside and reassured her that hopefully one day a bigger building would be built to fit all the children. Hearing this, Hattie resolved to save her pennies to make this happen.

When she died not long after, a small purse was found under her pillow containing the 57 cents she had saved. At her funeral her mother gave the money to Conwell, which he took to the church and, telling her story, announced it as the first gift towards the new Sunday School building. Conwell changed the money into pennies which he offered for sale. They were sold for \$250, and almost all of the pennies were returned to him as well. The \$250 was then changed into pennies and sold for enough to buy the property for the school.

Inspired by Hattie May's generosity, the congregation not only built a bigger Sunday School but an entire new church. The "Wiatt Mite Society," named for her, managed to raise the money against all odds, and the church was built right on Broad Street.

The owner of the lot purchased for the new church accepted Hattie's pennies as the first down payment on the property, and though it was officially called Grace Baptist Church this new church also became known as The Temple. It was out of this church, bought with Hattie's pennies, that Temple University grew as well. Conwell declared that this congregation of thousands was born out of Hattie May's small investment.

He said "She is happy on high with the thought that her life was so full, that it was so complete, that she lived really to be so old in the influences she threw upon this earth."

Hattie May was the daughter of Joseph and Harriet (Hattie) J. Ball Wiatt and they lived in Philadelphia. She died of diphtheria at age 7, which her younger sister also contracted and died just five days later.

The church Hattie May inspired to be built now functions as the Temple Performing Arts Center and is a magnificent historic landmark.

The church still exists as The Grace Baptist Church of Blue Bell.

Are you a bargain hunter?

As you walk through a dollar store look for good deals. Our focus for the month of June is on balls—beach balls, rubber balls, deflated soccer balls with an air pump—any ball that would fit in a shoebox. Items may be left in the Operation Christmas Child (OCC) box outside of the church office.

From the downsized outdoor rummage and bake sale in April \$946.65 was raised. OCC uses this money to cover handling and shipping of those boxes overseas. The \$9.00 we include per box pays not only for shipping to over 100 countries, but also The Greatest Gift Gospel booklets, collection center and processing costs, training in local churches, and the Ministry Partner Guide.

Since 2009, more than 12.5 million children have reported decisions for Christ while taking The Greatest Journey. These children as well as those who hear the Gospel at shoebox outreach events share their faith with friends and family who in turn disciple others.

We do welcome your donations of the items mentioned above in the first paragraph, plus hygiene items such as wash cloths, small mirrors, and children's underwear; summer items like sunglasses and foldable hats; tee shirts and other small clothing items; and tools that will fit in a shoebox. Don't worry about school supplies just yet unless you see a bargain; we'll focus on those in August when the back-to-school sales occur.

Lena's oldest daughter, Ans, relocates to Leiden, seeing it as a glorious adventure. She meets and falls for a policeman, Erik, who enlists in the Dutch Nazi party . . . in name only, he claims.

Daring Ans joins the Dutch Resistance, placing them on opposing sides. Yet Ans still says "yes" to his proposal of marriage.

Miriam, a young Jewish violinist, flees Germany with her father. The pair cross into the Netherlands where she meets her soon-to-be husband, Avi, and is befriended by Ans.

Miriam and Avi are overjoyed at the birth of their daughter. But when the Gestapo begins rounding up Jews in Holland, daring plans are made to help the new family escape. Should Ana ask her mother, Lena, to assist them?

As decisions become more perilous and heartbreaking, who will find the strength and courage needed to endure?

MISSIONARY CARE COMMITTEE



DR. STEVE AND MARGIE DOTY
Wycliffe Bible Translators
Thailand

Our church will shortly have the pleasure of a visit with the Dotys, missionaries who have touched thousands of lives for Christ in their work as Wycliffe Bible translators.

We began partnering with them in 1997, while they were in Kenya. In 2001 they moved to Thailand, where they have remained.



Steve and Margie met in the Philippines, where Steve worked for Wycliffe. Margie went on to Houghton College, and then joined Wycliffe. They then married and were sent to their first assignment in the Solomon Islands. There they helped translate the Bible into the Pijin and Lau languages. Since then they have had three children and were involved in translation activities and translator recruitment in the United States before before taking assignments in Kenya and Thailand.

In Thailand, they have both been connected to Payap University, the first Christian university in the country. While there, Steve has headed the translation departments and taught the associated courses. He must also train, recruit, and manage teams of translators. It requires performing follow-up translation checks of the work and the management of these teams. There is a challenge to this task, because these teams of translators are working across several countries and many languages. Each language has its own pattern of sounds, pattern of written symbols, and pattern of word order. The overall goal is to create as accurate and true a translation as possible. Further compounding their task is that it is so dangerous that neither Steve nor Margie are working any longer in many of the countries to gather linguistic information. They train the local language specialists to go to the regions being studied.

Their return to the US after 18 years abroad happened just before the pandemic hit. They have been headquartered at Houghton College in New York during the Covid restrictions, where they have taught classes. Steve has additionally had to deal with managing translation teams across many countries, and time zones in the process of checking their work.

They now have two married children living in the US, and their youngest, Leah, is in Thailand training with Wycliffe to be a Bible Translator. Their work is vitally important to the spread of the Gospel. They ask for prayer support for this important work.

Be sure to have a word with them when they visit over the Independence Day weekend.

Designated Fund for Missionary Care and Local Missions

These two funds were established in September 2013 to replace the no longer available, long-standing Lovett Fund. The only source of monies now for missionary transportation costs for Table Talks or to preach; shortfalls; or special needs not covered by the church's annual Benevolence support, is from the Missionary Care Designated Fund. When Henderson County organizations our church supports through Local Missions are in need of extra monies for their support, the only source is the Local Missions Designated Fund.

This is a reminder that, should you want to give to either of these accounts, please write your check to the church and on the bottom state either "For Missionary Care DF" or "For Local Missions DF."
