

Session Highlights - January 18, 2021

The complete minutes of session meetings are posted on the Session Bulletin Board in the Fellowship Hall as soon as they are approved.

The stated meeting of the session was held via ZOOM with outgoing elders and all the officers-elect present for their examination. Outgoing elders Ralph Mitchell, Marvin Thomason and Charles Young were thanked for their service. Incoming elders: Deanna Crawford, Clay Haskins, Louis Haynes, Mimi Jamieson, Andy Morris, and Eloise Murray; along with the incoming deacons: Sherri Jones, Mark McGrath, Priscilla Rouse and Jan Stewart were welcomed and examined by the session. Ordination and/or installation of the new officers was tentatively approved for February 14.

Minutes for December 21 and January 7 were approved. New ministry assignments were approved as follows: Administration— Clay Haskins; CE—Deanna Crawford and John Van Wagoner; Finance with Treasurer Larry Mobley, and Mimi Jamieson; Member Life with Sara Emel and Marge Hever; Outreach—Brenda Bradshaw and Louis Haynes; Worship—Carol Broyles, Robert Burns, and Andy Morris; and Personnel—Eloise Murray.

Deacon Sherri Jones discussed the calls the deacons will be making to the members about getting their correct information entered into our new Realm software. Finance people, Mimi Jamieson, Larry Mobley, and Bookkeeper Rick Stewart will help the deacons understand what they need to convey to members.

The Finance Ministry reported on the end of the year financial situation as follows: Praise God we finished this COVID year with \$165,969 in the General Fund account up from \$88K at the end of 2019, and in the best shape at the end of the year we have seen for a number of years.

Outreach, Administration, Personnel, and Member Life Ministries had not met during January and had no reports due to the church closing through January.

Christian Education Ministry received approval for youth gatherings — indoor and outdoor, but not to be held at the church due to the current church closure for COVID-19


Worship Ministry received approval for the hiring a part-time technician for the King Street worship.

Presbytery commissioners for the meeting on January 30 via ZOOM were elected as Mimi Jamieson and Ralph Mitchell. Church Rolls were reduced by four for people who had moved and/or requested their removal.

The time together was completed with a continuing discussion of the book *Who Stole My Church?*

A message from Gayle

Many of you have expressed interest in hearing about John Bayne, who graced us with beautiful organ and piano solos and accompanied events during his youth at Hendersonville Presbyterian.

John is hoping to complete his sophomore year during May at Furman University in Greenville, South Carolina. Driven by a life-long love for learning, John's plans are to double-major in both Music Performance (concentrating on Pipe Organ) and Philosophy. As a music major, John



adheres to a rigorous and disciplined routine of classes, homework and daily organ practice. He feels that he is blessed with professors with high expectations, expertise, and genuine kindness who are qualified professionals willing to help.

A member of the American Guild of Organists, John is on the rostrum for rotating as organist on the pipe organ for the currently virtual Sunday services at the beautiful Daniel Chapel on the Furman campus. John considers this an honor after attending programs and services there during his childhood and youth.

In September 2020, due to Covid-19, John began virtual classes from home for a month. Desiring to enjoy campus life and the company of fellow students who have been so thoughtful, kind, and who have displayed good character, he opted to finish the Fall 2020 semester on campus while following strict Furman protocol regarding Covid caution. John has had six nostril/throat Covid tests to be able to continue with this routine. All Covid tests have shown negative. Furman randomly tests their students throughout the on-campus time and any student who tests positive, even if asymptomatic, must go into guarantine.

Apart from his studies, John works part time as a waiter at Tryon Estates near his home in the summer. The friendliness and encouragement of the senior citizens is exhibited when the residents and other staff persuade him to play piano music after dinner.

When opportunity allows, John spends time hiking, hanging out, playing video games and eating out with both Staff at Tryon Estates and fellow students at Furman. John has found his classmates to be respectful, well-behaved, and of high character. Most of John's friends at Furman are serious students. Music majors have a rigorous schedule and devote much time to practice and studies.

After having been homeschooled K-12, John has adjusted to classroom academia quite well and has been on the Dean's List each semester. His most enjoyable courses overall probably have been Spanish during his freshman year, and Music Theory, his sophomore year. Qualifying, John was invited to join the Phi Eta Sigma (honor society) at Furman. He has a challenging year of studies ahead.



Ms. Margaret Regeness has a birthday soon!


Ms. Margaret, who served many years as our church librarian, will celebrate her 99th birthday on February 9th!

INTERVARSITY CHRISTIAN FELLOWSHIP USA – NORTH CAROLINA

As a new year begins, InterVarsity Christian Fellowship ministry continues to thrive despite the challenges and restrictions from the coronavirus. Doug Flaherty, Area Director for InterVarsity's Carolina Region, writes in his last email update reflecting on 2019, that he believes the fruitfulness of this year has been a result of "simply showing up and being faithful to pursue students."

Because of the virus, most campuses around the Carolinas have not been functioning in their usual manner. The creative and persistent staff and student leaders have continued to make connections with students through limited socially distanced activities, small group meetings, Zoom Bible studies, and internet chat groups, texts, and emails.

Area campuses have just started returning to school after being out since mid-November. Most chapters are not able to meet in large group events yet. They are meeting virtually. Some chapters are experimenting with activities that can be held outdoors while still maintaining social distancing.

In addition to supporting and supervising staff at UNCA, Lenoir Rhyne, and App State, Doug has been pursuing fledging ministries at both AB Tech and Blue Ridge Community College. On the AB Tech campus, a math professor (James) has provided advisory input and encouragement to a couple of students who are leading Zoom Bible studies. They are developing as leaders and have had good attendance. At Blue Ridge Community College, Doug has engaged a wonderful staff student advisor, and student leaders are starting to step forward. Both these schools are in our backyard!

Like the rest of us, Covid-19 has affected Doug's family life and his work environment. His three younger boys have attended in-person school where his wife Rachel teaches, but have been home for virtual schooling periodically. His oldest son is a junior at Asheville High and does 100% virtual classes and will continue this through the end of this school year. Because of the virus restrictions, Doug has worked from his home, and InterVarsity has generously provided flexible hours to meet the changing needs of his family. The close quarters during quarantine periods have caused Doug and Rachel to realize they needed a larger home. They purchased an extra lot from a neighbor and began building a new home four doors down the road. Doug occasionally works on the house and the boys enjoy tagging along, lifting a hammer when they can. The Flaherty's love the neighborhood and have invested relationships with the neighbors, so they are thrilled to stay in the West Asheville area.

Doug is now part of a new EPC church plant in Asheville. He is on the leadership team. It is exciting to have another EPC church in the area!

Tracking David aboard the Logos Hope

It's a new year and some of you may be wondering where David and the crew of the Logos Hope are docked now. Currently the ship is in St. Vincent and the Grenadines Islands.

The ship and its crew spent almost three months in the Bahamas, traveling between Freeport and the northern island of



Abaco. They waited for governmental permission to travel and loaded up with supplies in Freeport before sailing to North Abaco Island to do relief and reconstruction work on homes devastated by Hurricane Dorian in 2019. Teams from the ship were ferried ashore to join another ministry, the *Pacific Hope*, bringing eye glass testing and fittings, dental care, and home repair. What a change from the bookstore and aboard-ship ministry that the crew ordinary does. What an eye-opening experience. But the outcome was the same – sharing the hope and love of Jesus Christ.

The crew traveled on to St Vincent in early December. Still under lockdown orders, the crew celebrated the month of December with weekly Advent services, seasonal performances, singing carols, and sharing traditional holiday foods and other traditions.

The crew was cleared to go ashore beginning Christmas Day. They had Christmas week off, so David went ashore with a group of his friends to hike to a volcano. Another time, David and several other crew members took some vacation time to rent out an Air B&B for several days. They went into the city to talk with people, but social distancing made it difficult to connect and share.

The country is once again under voluntary lockdown, so there is no offship ministry happening now. David spends his time welding, training other crew members, participating in praise and worship, maintaining intimacy with the Lord, and learning lots of patience.

David extended his ministry tour until the middle of February. However, he surprised us by telling us his supervisor asked him to stay a couple extra weeks to train a recruit coming aboard with the next wave of recruits. David hopes to introduce him (or her) to the welding responsibilities aboard the ship. He had an experienced welder 'hand off' to him, and he wants this new person to have the same opportunity.

Some prayer requests for David and the crew – pray for the safe arrival of 40+ new recruits joining the ship. God's direction in planning for visits to ports in 2021. Despite the pandemic, God would bless the ministry to people of St. Vincent. Give wisdom, direction to David as he nears end of his term.

Finoana is now on his second prayer notebook and wants to become a preacher when he grows up.
