


Anticipation is Growing!

We will begin with two services of worship: at 9:00 am in the Fellowship Hall we will relaunch our Contemporary Worship Service, and at 11:00 am we will re-launch our Traditional Worship Service. The Contemporary worship service will be led by our amazing Worship Band, under the leadership of Kate Hurley. The Traditional worship service will be led by our incredible Choir, directed by Gayle Stepp. Both services will be similar in structure, but distinct in their style of music. Beginning August 1, we will also be asking those who would be interested in attending an 8:15 worship service to sign up either at the church, or by emailing the church office. More information about that will be coming in the weeks ahead As we relaunch, we want to reach as many as possible with worship.

Speaking of relaunching...on July 18, we will be relaunching two very different, but very important ministries: the Inquirers/New Members Class, and the Bluegrass Bash!

The Inquirers/New Members class will take place right after worship at noon on July 18. We will be providing lunch, and as such, will need people to sign up if they would like to attend. This will be a great time to explore who Hendersonville Presbyterian Church has been, is, and is becoming. We will look into our rich history, our theological moorings, our focus and vision as a Body, and our denominational identity. It will be a fun afternoon to get to know some of the leadership of the church and to get to know others who are new to our church family (including me!).

The evening of July 18 will be an amazing time of celebration, music, and fellowship, as we relaunch the 12th year of the Bluegrass Bash! "One of the longest running outreach programs of the Church" as I am told, the Bluegrass Bash combines amazing music, great fellowship, and ice cream! And who wouldn't want some Ice Cream in the middle of July? Come join us July 18th in the Fellowship Hall at 7:00 pm for the kick-off of the 12th year of the Bash with special guests Lynn Goldsmith and the Jeter Mountain Band! Invite your friends!

Session Highlights, June 14, 2021

The complete minutes of session meetings are posted on the Session Bulletin Board in the Fellowship Hall as soon as they are approved.

The session met a week early with 10 of 12 elders present, with Treasurer, Larry Mobley, and no deacon representative, as they were meeting at the same time.

The HPC COVID-19 Task Force recommended unanimously lifting all COVID-19 restrictions on church activities with the single exception of maintaining masking for those riding the church van. This was wholeheartedly and unanimously approved along with the Task Force's suspension. They were sincerely thanked for their diligent and conscientious work. Finance Ministry reported the end of May General Fund balance at about \$260,000. Quarterly benevolence payments, half of the denominational per member askings, and other quarterly or semi-annual payments will be made in June, which will bring the balance down considerably.

The pastor offered a number of suggestions for reopening schedules and proceeding into the future now that COVID seems in the rearview mirror:

- 1.Filling a second pastoral staff position as follows: That the session, rather than the presbytery and congregation, hire an Assistant Pastor with emphasis on Youth and Families;
- 2.It was agreed that the session meet for pizza and study together on Wednesday, July 7 at 6:00, with discussion of the Assistant Pastor position, being the only session business of that evening;
- 3. There will be a New Members class on Sunday, July 18, following worship;
- 4. When the contemporary service moves back to a 9:00 a.m. Sunday mornings on August 1, we hold a "Grand Re-Opening of this establishment of 168 years under the same management." There will be banners, advertising, and sign-ups for Sunday School and Small Groups during the Coffee Hour. There was discussion of how we might have Coffee Hour at both the 10:30 (between services) time and after the traditional service time;
- 5. August 22 will be a recognition of our students and teachers, both sacred and secular, and mark the beginning of Sunday School classes and small group meetings;
- 6. The Pastor asked the elders to set aside Sept. 10-12 for a Session Retreat. Outreach Ministry made plans for the visit of Steve and Margie Doty with Wycliffe for July 3 and 4;

The Operation Christmas Child Area Team will use our church for their kickoff event on September 11.

Administration Ministry reported on the repair work on the brakes done on our 22-year-old church van and requested session guidance on how to proceed with his concerns about our van's continued viability.

Personnel Ministry reported that Kate Hurley has decided to continue with our contemporary service when they make the change from Saturday to Sunday. Women in Ministry received approval to start meeting again in September with refreshments. The approval also covered luncheons in September, December and next June.

Sara Emel announced that she would soon be retiring as Church Librarian. The news was greeted with regret and much thanks for her past commitment.

Worship Ministry reported that they will continue to use the prepackaged communion cups until October. The current method of collecting offerings will continue, rather than having the offering plate passed. It was decided that we would no longer use the name King Street Service, and that that the Sunday worship services would be called simply "the 9:00 Contemporary Service" and "the 11:00 Traditional Service."

A New Beginning

I have been thinking about caterpillars lately. The old farmers say that when we see lots of caterpillars, there will be a long cold winter. Farmers know that fruit trees need dormancy, or they do not bloom and produce fruit; or in a worse scenario, if the weather is warm long enough, the bark could split.

Recently, our church has been in a sort of dormancy. In March of 2020, we stopped regularly practiced activities. Like the fruit tree, perhaps, this is giving us the opportunity to renew and spring forth fresh green growth. Fruit trees do not remain the same size, and they do not live forever. They need to be cared for, pruned, and replaced periodically. With the cold winter and warm summer and enough rain and sunshine, the trees grow.

Let us look at the caterpillar—our weather gauge. The caterpillar does not remain a caterpillar. He, too, goes into a dormant period. After remaining in a cocoon, the caterpillar emerges as a butterfly. I do not know if the butterfly remembers being a caterpillar; but as I watch them flutter, they seem to be enjoying their new life.

We have a chance to enjoy our new life. As we celebrate our Grand re-Opening, it is important to evaluate the condition of the fruit trees. Do some of the activities, like the fruit tree, need to be removed or pruned. Like the caterpillar, which served as our weatherman for the farmer, the butterfly becomes so much more.

The session has determined to re-open our church activities gradually. We know that worship is our chief end: that we are to glorify God and enjoy him forever. That is what worship is! Like fruit trees, we are not the same. Some people like apples; some oranges; some peaches; and some probably even like lemons!

Therefore, beginning August 1; we will offer two services with distinct styles of music on Sunday morning. The contemporary service will be at 9:00 a.m. in the fellowship hall and the Traditional service at 11:00 a.m. in the sanctuary.

The choir will begin rehearsing on Wednesday August 4 at 4:00 p.m., preceded by Chime rehearsal at 3:00 p.m. Bell and Chime schedules will alternate each quarter.

The choir, like the butterfly, has a purpose. The choir is to represent the people of God in singing praises to HIM.

This is just the beginning, as we are becoming . . .

After a long COVID-19 hiatus, the Blue Grass Bash is returning just in time to celebrate its 12th anniversary of fun, fellowship, praise, and toe-tapping rhythms! And, according to Tanya Jones, there will be some outstanding music—not to mention extra special refreshments in honor of the occasion!

The gala evening will feature Lynn Goldsmith and The Jeter Mountain Band. This Henderson County-based group plays a variety of genres and describe themselves as true to their roots: "From high energy blues/rock to sweet country/bluegrass ballads, this group shares the soul of all things Carolina."

The idea of holding a monthly bluegrass concert came from our then Lay Pastor Dwayne "Doc" Durham, who was also the leader of the bluegrass group Appalachian Fire. He said he decided to hold the first Bluegrass Bash at the church more than a decade ago because he wanted to promote traditional mountain music and tie it in with gospel music.

The combination of gospel and bluegrass music proved to be a hit with members of the church and other fans from the community. Only about 20 to

30 percent of the people who have attend the concerts over the years are church members. The other attendees come from various backgrounds, denominations and ages to hear both original gospel music and old-time Southern gospel songs. A love offering for the band is taken.

More than 200 people attended the first concert in the parking lot in 2009.

The Nature of Small Birds by Susan Finkbeiner

In 1975, three thousand children were airlifted out of Saigon to be adopted into Western homes. When Mindy, one of those children, announces her plans to return to Vietnam to find her birthmother, her loving adopted family is suddenly thrown back to the events surrounding her unconventional arrival in their lives.

Though her father supports Mindy's desire to meet her family of origin, he struggles privately with an unsettling fear that he'll lose the daughter he's poured his heart into. Mindy's mother undergoes the emotional rollercoaster inherent in the adoption of a child from a wartorn country, discovering the joy hidden amid the difficulties. And Mindy's sister helps her sort through relics that whisper of the effect the trauma of war has had on their family . . . but also speak of the beauty of overcoming.

Told through three strong voices in three compelling timelines, *The Nature of Small Birds*, is a hopeful story that explores the meaning of family far beyond genetic code.

This is a story that will linger with you long after the last page is turned, and in the end, you might want a longer journey.

I am looking forward to open library days to begin soon. Meanwhile, please call me to meet you in the library. There are so many wonderful books waiting to be read.

Creative Beginnings

The hallways in the preschool are quiet now, giving me time to reflect on what a great ministry Creative Beginnings has been for years and still is for the families in our community. As we strive to minister to the

overall healthy development.

nity. As we strive to minister to the children, we also look at ways to stimulate the diversity of children's play experience to focus on development of the whole child. After much research, the board members of the preschool have voted unanimously to incorporate more "Nature Play" on our playground to help contribute to the children's

Research has shown that today's children and families often have limited opportunities to connect with nature. Families are eating more processed food and moving less. These changes have led to an epidemic of serious threats in childhood, such as obesity, diabetes, sleep apnea, social and psychological problems.

In the past decade, the benefits of connecting to nature have been well documented by numerous scientific research studies and publications.

Nature Play supports positive impacts which include:

- developmental domains: social, intellectual, emotional, physical, and spiritual. (Kellert 2005)
- creativity and problem solving. (Kellert 2005)
- enhances cognitive abilities. (Wells 2000)
- improves academic performance. (American Institutes for Research, 2005)
- reduces Attention Deficit Disorder (ADD) symptoms. (Kuo and Taylor 2004)
- increases physical activity (Bell and Dyment 2006)
- improves nutrition (Morris & Zidenburg-Cherr 2002)
- improves eyesight (American Academy of Ophthalmology 2011)
- improves social relations (Burdetter and Whitaker 2005)
- improves self-discipline (Taylor, Kuo and Sullivan 2001)
- reduces stress (Wells and Evans 2003)

"How can we incorporate more nature play?", one might ask: More shrubs, vines, flowers, edible fruits, and vegetables in raised beds; possibly, a mud kitchen and sensory sidewalks with different mediums of nature to explore; round, wooden disks to skip and jump on; rough cut logs to balance upon; butterfly bushes; a faux campfire with more natural seating and a teepee made from natural materials. These are

some ideas that our teachers and board have compiled. God made all of nature for our enjoyment. What a great way to teach each child how special they are in God's creation!
