Fall is Here and You Know What That Means...

Dear Hendersonville saints,

Fall is here and that means change!

The weather changes. The length of the days change. The leaves change color. The apples have changed and are ripe, crisp, and delicious! If you go to the Visit North Carolina webpage linked here: https://www.visitnc.com/story/wJa5/hear-the-sound-of-fall-color-for-the-first-time, you can hear the sounds of fall color for the first time. That's right! I said, "HEAR the COLOR." That is a change.

Fashion changes in the fall people are wearing more layers or heavier clothes. Change is actually a normal part of life here in North Carolina.

Another change that is taking place is that we are becoming part of a new Presbytery within the EPC. Our denomination is growing (we have been the fastest growing denomination in the world for the past 10 years or so). And due to that growth, our Presbytery is multiplying into three new Presbyteries.

We will no longer be part of the Presbytery of the Mid-Atlantic. We will be part of the Central Carolinas Presbytery. We will still be focused on the same Strategic Initiatives, and we will be seeking to accomplish those with a wonderful group of Churches and Church Plants within the central part of the Carolinas.

Just to remind everyone of what those Strategic Initiatives are which we value and prioritize as a denomination, here they are:

- 1. Multiplication A strategic focus on Church Planting.
- 2. Transformation A focus on the Great Commission to transform the local Church.
- 3. Effective Biblical Leadership Teaching and Ruling Elders working together to establish a vibrant, growing church that engages the local community and the world, while developing the next generation of leaders within the Church.
- 4. Global Movement Through our global outreach, to be pointed in how we work to reach the "hard places" of the Middle East, Africa, and other predominantly Muslim areas of the world. We see God working there in amazing ways and want to work with the Spirit to be a catalyst for eternal change.

A few more changes are taking place We will be changing the mode in which we pick up members and guests from Lake Pointe Landing, Carolina Village and Brookdale. We will be using our NEW Mini-Bus! It was recently delivered and will be in use beginning in early October! Thank you to all who generously gave to make this possible.

As Fall moves toward winter, more changes will come. Change is inevitable. It happens all around us each day. Change, as scary as it is, is a healthy thing. As our leadership looks at how God might be changing us, please pray for us in our discernment process. We want to be a growing and vibrant church that multiplies in healthy ways within the community and impacts Henderson County and the World with the Gospel of Jesus Christ. It will be an exciting adventure to do that together!

Session Highlights, September 20, 2021

The complete minutes of session meetings are posted on the Session Bulletin Board in the Fellowship Hall as soon as they are approved.

The Session met with all elders in attendance. We were particularly delighted to have Mimi joining us on Zoom. The meeting was opened with a shared prayer incorporating praise for the generosity of the congregation that enabled the purchase of the new minibus; the joy experienced being together at the church picnic; thankfulness for all of the new discipleship groups; and intercessional requests for all of those members suffering from illness or any adversity.

Minutes of the August Session meeting were approved as was an email vote to accept five new members received on August 29, 2021. The Finance report expressed gratitude for the continued generosity of the congregation thus keeping us in a favorable financial position.

The Finance Ministry was thanked for providing Finance Ministry members to act as liaisons to the other ministries during budget preparation.

Priscilla Rouse reported that the Deacons were working closely with several members who were currently experiencing acute needs. They continue to show Christian love for all and are studying boundaries of caring.

Member Life thanked everyone who worked tirelessly to make our picnic a success. Special thanks go to Eva House for her oversight of the picnic as well as all who helped make it happen. Thanks also to Steve Byrd for making his signature Brunswick Stew.

John Van Wagoner reported that over 70 people were signed up for new Discipleship Groups and also that the Officer Nominating Committee was making good progress.

Carol Broyles brought from Worship Ministry a motion to cancel consideration of restarting an 8:15 worship service. The motion was based on the fact that we have slipped below 300 members and a third service was believed to be unsustainable at this time. After discussion the Session voted with regret to cancel consideration of an 8:15 service at this time.

Administration Ministry had no action items but reported that the minibus was scheduled to arrive this week; we successfully passed our fire inspection; and had six staff members recertified in CPR training.

The last two action items were to extend permission for outside organizations that previously met in this church to resume meeting here. After discussion, Louis Haynes moved that organizations who met here before Covid be allowed to resume meeting in this facility. Motion was seconded by Carol Broyles and passed unanimously. In a second motion Andy Morris moved that Administration Ministry be authorized to approve any such future requests from an outside organization re: using our facility without having to get Session approval first. Louis Haynes seconded the motion which passed unanimously.

Pastor Rob told Session members that the church is in an exciting new place with amazing opportunity for growth. He challenged us to consider changes we need to make to grow and reach young families. He asked us to consider two things: first, What ministries cannot change? And second what ministries could be pruned without hurting the church.

Meeting was adjourned with prayer.

The new minibus is a 2022 Ford E350 vehicle with improved seating and access. It will be safer than the previous van with better handling and a lower center of gravity. A MOMENT FOR LOCAL MISSIONS...

Child Evangelism Fellowship and the Good News Club are Alive and Kickin'

"When God closes a door, He opens a window." This saying is true for the Good News Club (GNC) organization and its parent ministry, Child Evangelism Fellowship (CEF). Because of Covid-19 restrictions, the after-school Good News Clubs have not been able to start in the elementary schools. The annual Spectacular held at the Fletcher Agricultural Center was also cancelled. When these ministries closed, God opened some alternative opportunities. This summer, volunteer teams offered Good News Clubs at several daycare centers, the Hendersonville Salvation Army childcare center, an African American child development center in Asheville, and two clubs held at two church locations.

When the Spectacular was cancelled, the CEF leadership felt led to hold Mini Spectaculars instead. CEF purchased four large bounce houses, blowup air equipment, a trailer, and popcorn and snow cone machines. CEF has held seven Mini Spectaculars so far this year and have two more scheduled thru the end of 2021. They set up at churches and ministry centers, with volunteers presenting the Gospel and offering free family fun. In all, we had 400 people attend with 57 salvations decisions.

At the WNC State Fair, September 10–19, Child Evangelism Fellowship had a booth. Area Director, Jason Beverly, and a team of volunteers, witnessed to 530 people with 29 people making decisions for Christ.

This summer CEF trained 18 new volunteers that are now ready to enter the school clubs when they open. In Henderson County we have seven schools that will allow GNC clubs to start again this Spring, Covid permitting. A new after-school GNC is scheduled to begin October 2021 thru May 2021 at Leicester Elementary in Buncombe County. Our staff has made connections with school administrators in Haywood, and Tran-sylvania Counties as well. The Lord has truly opened new doors for us to walk through. As Jason Beverly likes to say, "God is using CEF to bring Sunday School to the elementary school."

Hendersonville Presbyterian Church has always had a heart for youth ministry. HPC has budgeted money for Child Evangelism Fellowship and supports the Good News Club at Bruce Drysdale Elementary School.

MISSIONARY CARE COMMITTEE REV. PAUL AND REINHILD SYDNOR International Association for Refugees France

Paul Sydnor has been serving in refugee ministry since 1985. He explains why refugee ministry is his life passion in his latest update. He cites Hebrews 11:13-14 which says that there were those who "confessed that they were strangers and aliens on the earth ... seeking a homeland:" He feels refugee ministry helps him recognize and appreciate those who long for a home, understanding



that God wants to walk with them through this displacement journey, finding their hope in Him.

Paul is the director of a refugee ministry in his hometown of Lille, France. The Lille Centre provides services such as language help, cell phone repair, fellowship and prayer, shared meals, laundry service, and assistance with refugee documentation. In his most recent newsletter, Paul mentioned the continual 'stress' asylum seekers feel. They daily encounter challenges over basic needs that we take for granted—Where to find food? How to become qualified for work? Where to find an affordable and working phone? Where to sleep?

This stress and pain have led Paul to develop a trauma support group. The group of 3-5 people meet for 5 sessions to help them get in touch with their feelings and experiences. He is currently on his third round of trauma sessions.



A gas cooker a welcome blessing

Paul often leaves the Centre to go meet people where they are in make-shift camps, on the streets, or in a café sharing a cup of coffee. For one refugee, Paul visited with him in a camp, helping him install a gas cooker. The man was a Christian and, as they talked, Paul rejoiced when the man said that his refugee journey had taught him that "he was safe with God." Another time Paul met an asylum seeker who shared, "I want to follow the Christian way." Paul gladly shared some scriptures and has continued meeting him for weekly prayer and discussion as he grows in his faith.

A most recent challenge is still in process:

finding affordable housing. So, Paul is working on a project proposal to raise support to help pay for apartment rental cost for people in emergency situations. Pray for God to give him wisdom and guidance. Paul and Reinhild are fully vaccinated, so they will be visiting the US to see friends, family, and supporters. They will be sure to visit their son, Noah, and his wife, Angie, and their new baby, Nolan.

Stay tuned to hear announcements about Paul and Reinhild's visit to HPC sometime this fall.

Designated Fund for Missionary Care and Local Missions

These two funds were established in September 2013 to replace the no longer available, long-standing Lovett Fund. The only source of monies now for missionary transportation costs for Table Talks or to preach; shortfalls; or special needs not covered by the church's annual Benevolence support, is from the Missionary Care Designated Fund. When Henderson County organizations our church supports through Local Missions are in need of extra monies for their support, the only source is the Local Missions Designated Fund.

Kirkin' o' the Tartans at Hendersonville Presbyterian - October 17, 2021 at 11 am



On Sunday, October 17, at 11 am, Hendersonville Presbyterian Church will present a Kirkin' o' the Tartans Service honoring the Scottish heritage of the Presbyterian Church and of many families within the church. The service is designed to recognize the faithfulness of families who have passed their Christian faith and love of country down through the generations, regardless of their national origin.

The service includes the proud playing of traditional Scottish hymns by the Montreat Scottish Pipes and Drums and the presentation of the tartans for blessing. There will be 62 tartans for blessing, 35 of which will be carried in a processional, and 27 tartans on display. All families represented will be blessed.

Legend holds that the service originated in Scotland during a time in the eighteenth century when, following the failure of the Jacobite Rebellion of 1745, the English forbade the Scots to wear their clan-identifying tartans. Not only were these symbols of geographical and family unity outlawed, so were the traditional bagpipes and music so dear to the Scots.

In defiance, and as a show of faith during this bleak time, brave Highlanders would hide a small bit of fabric on their person and wear it to church (in Scotland a church is called a "kirk"). At a predetermined time, when the minister would slip a blessing into the service, all would all secretly touch their mate-

rial. This blessing at church (or "kirking") of the tartans was one way of staying connected to their heritage.

The practice was revived during World War II by the Reverend Peter Marshall, a native of Scotland, who was then Chaplain of the U.S. Senate. To encourage Scottish Americans to enlist in the war effort on behalf of Great Britain, Marshall recreated the "Kirkin' o' the Tartans" ceremony at his home church, New York Avenue Presbyterian, in Washington, DC. Since that time, Presbyterian Churches (as well as other denominations) around the country have celebrated this annually in thanksgiving for our freedom to worship.

Whether presenting banners or not, all who wish to do so are encouraged to wear their own plaids as they join in this uplifting ceremony.
