Session Highlights - December 19, 2022

The complete minutes of session meetings are posted on the Session Bulletin Board in the Fellowship Hall as soon as they are approved.

Twenty-three elders, deacons and officers elect met over a pizza and covered dish dinner for a joint meeting and the examination of incoming officers.

The Deacons' outgoing chair Sherri Jones highlighted their distribution of 28 Christmas gift bags to shut ins.

Personnel Committee presented the new Web Manager position at 5 hours a week. A Job Description draft was circulated. Stacy McClelland had been recommended to fill the position in addition to her interim Children's Director responsibilities which she currently does for 15 hours a week. An extension of Stacy's current interim contract through June 2023 was unanimously approved. Personnel reported they had approved staff bonuses for the year end.

Local Outreach requested \$5,000 as a one-time gift to a relatively new organization, Refuge Retreat, from the Local Mission Designated Fund. Five retreats have been held (two per year) for college-age Christians with attendance ranging from 50-80 attendees.

The Clerk requested volunteers for the four commissioners to the Presbytery meeting at Centre Presbyterian Church in Mooresville, NC on January 27-28.

During the Pastor's Report the Treasurer, Larry Mobley, was invited to present his proposal for the anticipated income over expenses amount at the end of the year. If the end of year balance in the General Fund should be more than the usual (but slightly inflation-adjusted \$175,000 necessary carryover) then the overage would have 60% moved to designated funds with a tithe of 10% to Local Outreach Designated Fund; 10% to Missionary Care Designated Fund; and the balance of 80% would go into the Building Designated Fund, in anticipation of next year's fundraising for our much needed, numerous building repairs.

The Pastor passed out the Ministry Assignments for 2023 as follows:

Administration: Facilities- Clay Haskins and Doug DiRienzo; Finance-Mimi Jamieson; Personnel-Eloise Murray; Outreach: Local Missions-Andy Morris; Missionary Care-John Spencer;

Discipleship: Caryl Mobley and Robert Wallace; Member Life: Betsy Price and Pam Van Tassel; and Worship: Deanna Crawford and Pat Johnson

Everyone had received their first or second choices. The positions of Clerk, Mimi Jamieson; Assistant Clerk, Eloise Murray; and Treasurer, Larry Mobley were separately approved.

Examination of New Officers took place with sharing of faith stories, questioning, and discussion of scruples to the Westminster Confessions. Officers were then approved as follows;

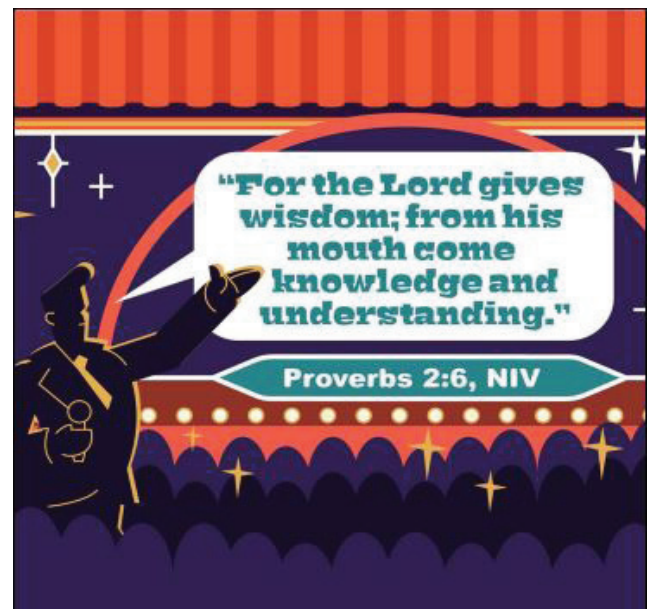
HPC Children

What are your Special Gifts?

Our church has been involved OCC for over 20 years. It is a project of Samaritan's Purse, an international relief organization. Our mission is to provide local partners around the world with shoeboxes filled with small toys, hygiene items, and school supplies as a means of reaching out to children in their own communities with the Good News of Jesus Christ.

Elizabeth Groff was on a special journey to help pack the 200-millionth Operation Christmas Child shoebox gift since the Samaritan's Purse project began in 1993. She took the 200-millionth shoebox gift across the United States and then to Ukraine.

Elizabeth, who received a shoebox gift years ago as a lonely child in an orphanage in Ukraine, traveled to different U.S. drop-off locations and processing centers with the symbolic shoebox to encourage people to prayerfully pack boxes in Jesus' Name.



The project reached this historic milestone as faithful shoebox packers brought their gifts to more than 4,500 locations across the country during National Collection Week (Nov. 14-21). We praise God for the millions of children, as well as families and communities, who have been reached with the Gospel of Jesus Christ over nearly three decades.

Elizabeth wants people to know that God is using these gifts to demonstrate His love to children who are in desperate need. "There are so many children out there just like me who have never heard of Jesus or experienced His everlasting love," she said. "I know the impact a single shoebox can make. It absolutely changed my life. There's no greater reward than being able to serve through this ministry."

As we enter a new year, we often ponder what activities we will focus on during the year. This is a great time to think about the gifts we are given by God.

In 1 Corinthians 12:18-20 (NIV) we read "But in fact God has arranged the parts in the body as he wanted them to be. If they were all one part, where would the body be? As it is, there are many parts, but one body." And in Romans 12: 6a, 7a, 8a we learn "We have different gifts, according to the grace given us. If it is serving, let him serve; if it is encouraging, let him encourage; if it is contributing to the needs of others, let him give generously."

Serving, encouraging, and helping others are hallmarks of Stephen Ministry. Our saying is, "We care, God cures."

Are these some gifts that you believe you have and would like to nurture? If so, God may be calling you to become a Stephen Minister. In 2023 we are organizing a class to train Stephen Ministers. We have not set up a schedule but hope to start the class sometime in March. Our first step will be to find out who in our congregation is interested in taking the classes. There are twenty classes in the training, and they can be taught over three to six months, depending on how frequently we hold classes. Here are a few of the topics you can learn about:

- The Art of Listening
- Distinctively Christian Caring
- Assertiveness: Relating Gently and Firmly
- Maintaining Boundaries in Caregiving
- Crisis Theory and Practice
- Confidentiality
- Using Mental Health Professionals and Other Community Resources

Designated Fund for Missionary Care and Local Missions

In September of 2013 the Endowment for Mission Support was created to replace the no longer available Lovett Fund. Each year a small portion of the proceeds of this fund is reinvested to continue growing the fund. The majority of the proceeds are evenly divided between the Missionary Care Designated Fund and the Local Church Missions Fund. The only source of monies now for missionary transportation costs, shortfalls; or special needs not covered by the church's annual Benevolence support, is from the Missionary Care Designated Fund. When Henderson County organizations our church supports through Local Missions are in need of extra monies for their support, the only source is the Local Missions Designated Fund.

This is a reminder that, should you want to give to either of these accounts, please write your check to the church and on the bottom state either "For Missionary Care DF" or "For Local Missions DF," or "For the Mission Endowment."

ANDREW and BECC BARON

"Power to Change"

CRU (FORMERLY CAMPUS CRUSADE FOR CHRIST)

BRISBANE, AUSTRALIA

Andrew and Becc Baron and their girls, Maddie (8), Brie (6), and Evie (3) are one of HPC's newest missionary families. Andrew is the son of Campus Crusade for Christ (CRU) missionaries Phillip and wife Rachel (d. 2019). Andrew and Becc serve with CRU in Australia through an organization known as "Power to Change." The couple primarily serves on one campus, Queensland University of Technology (QUT), in Brisbane, where they focus on reaching international students. Andrew and Becc are also part of a leadership team that helps direct and oversee five other campuses and ministries across the entire state of Queensland.



Andrew and Becc have seen God answer a 3-year long prayer for international ministry on the QUT campus. They asked God to raise up a small team of student leaders (called Movement Builders -MBs), that would commit to walking closely with Jesus, while making Jesus known on campus through purposeful outreach and discipleship. They are praising God for the seven wonderful student leaders, representing five different countries. Already In 2022, three students have begun a relationship with Jesus through these student leaders! Continue to pray that God would strengthen this leadership team and multiply them!



Navi, a business student from Sri Lanka, met Jesus this semester. Navi stopped by a lunch event and agreed to meet for coffee to hear more about Jesus. He was eager to read a suggested passage from the Gospel of Mark. He returned to the coffee date having read the entire book of Mark and recorded three pages of notes! Over a series of weeks, a student leader led Navi to Christ. This reminds us that the Holy Spirit continues to move in hearts and

minds of those around us.

Now in Australia the school year has finished, and students are celebrating. Beginning the last two weeks of November, high school seniors migrate to the Gold Coast beaches to celebrate graduation. Unfortunately, the crazed partying includes drugs and alcohol, fights, sexual activity, and violence. During these two weeks the Power to Change ministry mobilizes a 'Schoolies Mission Team' of 40+ students and staff to minister across different Brisbane campuses and beach areas. The student teams receive ministry training, biblical input, fellowship, and do night-time outreach on the streets and beaches until the early morning hours. Andrew and Becc help prepare and supervise these yearly events.

December and January are summer holiday months, but Andrew and Becc juggle summer relaxation with planning and training. The family decorates and celebrates Christmas, takes day trips and playtimes at the beach. In January Andrew and Becc will hold a local leadership retreat and attend a national staff conference. February 1-15 will begin the new semester outreach to meet and reach newly arriving international students around Brisbane. Amidst all these commitments, the girls happily meet and make friends with the students and staff. Life is very full for this missionary family.

Pray for the seven student leaders, the students who responded to the Schoolies Beach Mission, the planning for 2023, and for family refreshment over the summer break.
