Preparing for the Next Season

A long article by your short pastor



Well, it has happened! We have just surpassed the 2-year mark as partners in ministry. Sometimes time flies when you are having fun. And sometimes time seems to slow when you are having fun in the midst of a pandemic. It was June 17, 2020 when the search committee flew my family and me out to Hendersonville to be here for a “candidating” weekend. Covid was still in full swing, and that was our first Sunday opening back up for a Sunday morning traditional service. The contemporary service had been taking place throughout the summer on Saturday nights and sometimes in the parking lot. But for the first time since March of 2020, both services at Hendersonville Presbyterian happened in person on the same weekend. It didn’t last long, as we had some starts and stops along the way. And then on Saturday, August 1, 2020, I began ministry with you as your new Senior Pastor. It seems like forever ago.

It has been a season of celebration, as we reopened and slowly began ministry again. It has been a season of grief, as we lost members who moved away during the pandemic, and some went home to join the Church Triumphant. It has been a season of celebration, as we have added new members and celebrated baptisms. It has been a season of grief, as we lost long-time staff members who retired or moved on to a different position elsewhere. It has been a season of celebration and grief...and that wears on people. The emotional rollercoaster that comes with such emotions makes ministry even more difficult.

But now, we are preparing for a new season! The next season. Just like the seasons of the year, each season has blessings and difficulties, beauty and ugliness. As autumn approaches, it begins the beauty of the changing colors, the flavors of maple and pumpkin, the peaceful walks in cooler weather, and the kickoff of football! But Autumn also brings inconsistent weather, allergies, heavier clothes, raking leaves, and for some the kickoff of football.

But, in the midst of the beauty and in spite of the ugliness, life carries on, and things change...And we love it, and we don't, all at the same time.

The same is true in ministry. As the fall approaches, we will see new faces of people who have just moved to the area and are searching for a church home. We will hear about youth and children's events ramping up. The Kirkin' will be back at full force and will be an amazing celebration of worship! We will kick off our next round of Discipleship Groups, studying Ephesians. New Sunday morning adult classes will begin. And we will have some Wednesday night gatherings to continue our rediscovery process. It will not look the same as it has in the past, but no season is the same twice. It will still have the feeling of something familiar...but it will not be exactly the same. It will be amazing, and yet at times we will grieve...But, coming out of a world-changing season like the one we have been a part of since March of 2020, we can't expect things to go back to “normal.” They will never be back to the way they were prior to that event.

But, as a Church Family, we will find the new normal. We will find and celebrate the beauty in the next season. We will find opportunities to laugh together and cry together and walk through life, encouraging one another. We will elect a new round of elders and deacons. We will study and grow. We will pray for one another and expect miracles to happen. And it will feel very familiar, and at the same time, different.

As we prepare for this next season, Hendersonville Presbyterian Church's next steps remind me of the call to adventure Bilbo Baggins faces at the beginning of Tolkien's Book “The Hobbit.” Baggins loves the safety and security of his Hobbit hole. He loves the known routines. He loves his neighbors, as he has known them all his life. But when a group of Dwarves show up, who

Session Highlights - July 18, 2022

The complete minutes of session meetings are posted on the Session Bulletin Board in the Fellowship Hall as soon as they are approved.

The session met with 9 of its 12 elders and deacon representative Priscilla Rouse.

As a part of the Pastor's Report, we continued our book discussion of Church Unique.

A new job description is being worked on, so we can start interviewing for the facilities manager position. In the coming months we face a few big-time facility repairs: windows, roof, etc. and the concurrent financial challenges.

We then moved on to the situation we are currently in with our settlement payment to First Presbyterian Church. Buddy Massagee informed us by letter that we were in default on our payment, as this year's \$50,000 was not properly received by July 1. According to our note, this triggers the payment of 10% interest on the entire remaining amount or approximately \$55 a day until the entire amount is paid off with the possible additional impositions of legal fees up to \$30,000. The elders unanimously agreed that in the current situation we should pay off the remaining \$200,000 with the interest we currently owe of \$1,260.20 as quickly as possible.

Finance Committee reported our income for June had been in line with the usual anticipated amount for June. We are currently running well ahead of the five-year averages, but behind last year's great performance.

Outreach Ministry: Local Outreach received approval for the "Welcome Plan" required by Samaritan's Purse which had been written by Louis Haynes. Dr. Andy Morris was unanimously designated as the sponsor from our church for the Ukrainian family (ies) that we work with. The Refugee Resettlement Committee further asked that \$10,000 to be set aside for use for the Ukrainian Refugee Project. It was agreed that up to \$10,000 could be drawn from the Local Outreach Designated Fund as needed. The Refugee Resettlement Designated Fund, currently with \$7,400 in our congregation's donations, will be the account to receive the \$3,000 per person to come from Samaritan's Purse.

Global Outreach will withdraw up to \$425 for an airline ticket from the Missionary Care Designated Fund for our newest missionary, Leah (last name not used for security reasons), currently on leave in the US, to visit us on July 31. Mindy Henson and Shirley Fawcett Durant, both of whom have spent years in Ukraine, will be visiting and could meet with the Resettlement Committee on August 13 or 14.

Creative Beginnings received approval to become one of the four participants in the Apple Festival parking lot fundraiser.

Sherri Jones will be the Women's Ministry organizer of the Women's Ministry luncheon as part of the Presbytery meeting on Friday, Sept. 23, 11:00-12:30. Further, the Women in Ministry received approval to conduct four fundraisers/special service projects for the year.

Betsy Price and Caryl Mobley agreed to co-chair the committee to organize our hosting of the presbytery meeting September 23-24.

have been grieving great loss, he tries to be hospitable, but doesn't like it much. And then he receives the invitation to join them on a Great Adventure! He says "NO!" But when he awakes and they have left him behind, he is drawn to join the adventure to step out of his comfort zone and see what is different, what is beautiful, what is out in the world outside the Shire. And what an adventure Bilbo has! It is dangerous. It is difficult. At times he wants to stop and return to the comfort of the Shire. And yet, there is a calling deep within him which keeps him moving forward with the Dwarfs (which is the correct spelling according to Tolkien).

As we step into this next season of ministry, we will be going on an adventure together. Some of us will not want to come along on the adventure. That is all right! Some of us will rush out ahead of the group wanting the adventure quicker. That is all right as well! Some of us will start the adventure and then desire to return to the Shire, to the way things were in the past. That is quite all right too! But one thing is for sure... This next season of ministry will stretch all of us and draw us together as a unified congregation as we rely on God's leadership for this adventure!

Even now, let's begin preparing for this adventure. Mark down our Discipleship Group Kick-off Sundays on your calendar August 21 and August 28. The groups will begin in September. It will be a transformational walk through Ephesians. Remember, the Church in Ephesus had endured some rough things in their seasons of ministry. In Revelation 2, Jesus points out their perseverance, hard work, and fortitude. We can identify with that! But there is a transformational critique which comes after that affirmation. We will discuss that next month, as we begin our study of Ephesians and start walking into the next season of ministry here at HPC.

FIVE YOUNG MEN ... on a mission



Who ever said missionaries must be adults or travel great distances to share the good news of Jesus Christ? Well, five young men from the Greater Asheville area have proven that idea incorrect. These five are part of a larger group of teens from across North Carolina who have trained as summer missionaries with Christian Youth in Action (CYIA), a branch of Child Evangelism Fellowship.

HPC has supported Camp Good News, where the youth trained, and given a one-time gift to cover training cost and summer expenses for these five young men. The team of five includes Nathan (15), Isaiah (14), Joshua (14), Elijah (14), and Daniel (10), plus their adult leader, Jason Beverly. They present 5-Day Clubs, lasting 5 consecutive days, at churches, private homes, and pre-school and day care centers. During each club they teach songs, games, memory verse activities, a Bible lesson, and a Missionary story. They often travel to 3 or 4 different sites each day.

As an example, July 18-22, they led morning clubs at Asheville Church of the Nazarene and at Mud Creek Christian School, an afternoon club at Hendersonville Salvation Army, and an evening club at Waynesville Christian Fellowship. What a schedule!

The boys have specific prayer requests and praises. One boy was thankful that "God saved Marco from being a bully." Another asked prayer that "he wouldn't lose his voice" and that "the Word of God would be in their hearts."

Would you join with these 5 young men in praying that "many children would come to know the Lord?"

Answers to these prayers will be shared in future updates.

MISSIONARY CARE COMMITTEE

REV. PHILIP BARON

CRU: CITIES/CHURCH MOEMENTS
CHARLOTTE, NC, AND BEYOND

Rev. Philip Baron grew up in Asheville, and after university there joined CRU (formerly Campus Crusade for Christ) and was sent to The Philip-pines. While there he met his first wife, Rachel, and they were assigned to the university campuses across the Philippines.

The Barons expanded their field to all of Southeast Asia where they mentored and coached CRU campus leaders. Their work on these campuses was very successful, and they trained members to evangelize on a one-on-one plan called "Catalytic Strategy." After a few years in the field they returned to the US on furlough. When they returned to Manila they were assigned to the Global Campus Team traveling around the world.

The Catalytic Strategy continued to be very effective and raised up groups from many world-wide campuses. Phillip and Rachel relocated to North Carolina when their headquarters moved to Orlando in 2016. In 2017 Rachel was diagnosed with colon cancer and passed away in 2019. Phillip had been coaching CRU Staff teams from all parts of the globe during this time with encouraging results. About the same time, CRU changed their focus away from event-based evangelism to a focus on discipling students seeking to grow in Christ and expanding that message by helping others grow in Christ. Phillip decided to move to another branch of CRU that was focused on growing churches, communities and special community groups.

After a time Phillip met Sandy, a woman in his church who ironically had a history with CRU as a young believer. They were soon married. Sandy has joined his efforts to help ministers develop their programs to reach local communities and congregations. They have used the internet and Zoom to expand their reach of interested groups all across the country. Phillip has had a good response from many groups as they learn to appreciate his skills and depth of experience.

Both Philip and Sandy would welcome your prayers.

Designated Fund for Missionary Care and Local Missions

In September of 2013 the Endowment for Mission Support was created to replace the no longer available Lovett Fund. Each year a small portion of the proceeds of this fund is reinvested to continue growing the fund. The majority of the proceeds are evenly divided between the Missionary Care Designated Fund and the Local Church Missions Fund. The only source of monies now for missionary transportation costs, shortfalls; or special needs not covered by the church's annual Benevolence support, is from the Missionary Care Designated Fund.

When Henderson County organizations our church supports through Local Missions are in need of extra monies for their support, the only source is the Local Missions Designated Fund.

Here is one of the many stories from Samaritans Purse. The child in the story is Nestor, who is now an adult.

Nestor grew up on a coffee farm in El Salvador. Like many of the children in his community he had no toys of his own, so he often played with sticks, rocks and leaves. One day, the local church led by Nestor's older brother held an Operation Christmas Child outreach event where the children in the community, including Nestor, heard a message about Jesus' love for them and then each received a shoebox gift.

This event led the church of 25 to grow to nearly 75 people! Nestor said, "I saw lives being changed. Receiving a shoebox was something that changed my life, too, just thinking that God used someone to send a gift especially for me showed me how much He loves me. He used the shoebox gift as one of the seeds to show me the impact that He can make in the lives of children."


