Sunday School Lesson

The Book of Obadiah – Retribution to Enemies of Zion (November 3, 2024)

Setting

- Shortest book in Old Testament
- Obadiah = "servant of Yahweh"; written ~600 BC (probably before Jeremiah)
- Edomites are descendants of Esau and enemies of the descendants of Jacob
- Jerusalem was in Judah's (son of Jacob) land division
- Edomites plundered Jerusalem 4 times in 300 years, beginning in 9th century BC
- King Herod was an Edomite
- Obadiah's prophecy was regarding the Edomites.

Dating Obadiah

Difficulty in dating Obadiah because no kings are mentioned. Plunderings that Obadiah was preaching against¹

Psalm 137:7-9 ties Edom & Babylon

Obadiah's Vision

Obadiah condemned them for:

- 1) Verses 2 4 pride & arrogance
- 2) 5 7 greed & plunder
- 3) 8 9 loss of wisdom & understanding
- 4) 10-14 violence & gloating over the suffering of others

Judgment of All Nations

Verses 15 – 16, also Ezekiel 30:3, Jeremiah 25:15-16

This is the cup of the Lord's wrath. There will be tit-for-tat. Edom is one of the nations that Jeremiah's prophecy applied to: they will be getting the cup. The prophecy of Edom's demise and disappearance did, indeed, come true – there is no mention of them after Herod and the Maccabean revolt.

Deliverance

Verses 17 – 18

Verses 19-21

Summary

There is no mention of repentance or forgiveness for the Edomites; no opportunity for mercy. But there is encouragement for the Israelites: "the kingdom shall be the Lord's." Isn't this <u>exactly</u> the message Jesus promoted?

Who are your enemies? Are they God's enemies? God's enemy is Satan. We are supposed to pray for all our other enemies, and we need transformative deliverance from the Holy Spirit to do that.

Don't pick on "God's chosen." There are consequences for pride and arrogance.

Judgment and punishment is God's prerogative. God wins in the end. There is hope in the midst of adversity. "The kingdom shall be the Lord's."
